will be **Thursday**, September 9, 1999, at 7:30 p.m. in the Plattsburgh Room in the College Center of Plattsburgh State University. David Curtis Skaggs, Professor Emeritus of History, Bowling Green State University, and principal co-author of *A Signal Victory: The Lake Erie Campaign*, 1812-1813, (published by the Naval Institute Press, 1997. This work was a History Book Club alternate selection and winner of the North American Society for Oceanic History's prize as the best book on naval history for 1997. His talk entitled "Before Plattsburgh: Thomas Macdonough's Preparation for Command", will focus on the early years of Thomas Macdonough.

Professor Skaggs' current project is a book tentatively titled, Freshwater Commodores: Thomas Macdonough, Oliver Hazard Perry and the Fighting Tradition in the U.S. Navy.

This program is jointly sponsored by Clinton County Historical Association and the History Department of Plattsburgh State University. It is made possible with public funds from the New York State Council on the Arts, a state agency, and also by the Institute of Museum and Library Sciences, a federal agency serving the public by strengthening museums and libraries. It is free and open to the public.

Letter from the Day Family Papers Collection

Mount Pleasant Sept 21/66 (1866)

Dear Jimmie

Yours to me, of Sept came to hand in due time. I intended to have answered immediately, but have delayed until now, in fact I cant find time. Except evenings and then I am to tired to write, for I suppose the girls keep you posted in all the matters things here, so that saves my writing so often. This is Friday, and it is the first day I have seen the sun since last Saturday, it has been Rain Rain Every Day it has been cold Equinoxal Storm, and (?) of last night with a pretty good Jack Frost this morning. Pretty early I think, for frosttime. the 12th day of this month, I came in to Dinner and not a Grass hopper to be seen, in about an hour or so I went out and the air was filled with them and the ground covered, and they have stayed ever since and Eat up, Every green thing. The fields look as dry as though fire had gone through them. I had 20 acres of winter wheat, up and green and firm, and now it is as bare as a housefloor. Not a spear to be seen. They have stript all of the corn leaves, and anything else that was green. I have a piece of Buck-wheat, and they have Eat up Every spear of it. And they are as thick as Ever today. I think they will Eat us out of house and home. They have Eat everything in the garden even the tomatoes.

We are all well as usual for now. Except for Millie who fails and has got to be a dreadful trial to take care of. Remember me to Grandma, and I suppose that she is the only one that wishes to know anything about me write often and I will write sometime when I can.
